Ross Henry Byron September 10, 1945—July 4, 2005



Ross attended many functions at LMYC and many members would see him at the club's Monday Luncheons.


All the members who knew him will mourn his passing. We will truly miss you Ross.


Ross and Meghan 2004 Preparing For Launch

#### MARS SPECTACULAR!

The Red Planet is about to be spectacular! This month and next, Earth is catching up with Mars in an encounter that will culminate in the closest approach between the two planets in recorded history. The next time Mars may come this close is in 2287. Due to the way Jupiter's gravity tugs on Mars and perturbs its orbit, astronomers can only be certain that Mars has not come this close to Earth in the Last 5,000 years, but it may be as long as 60,000 years before it happens again.

The encounter will culminate on August 27th when Mars comes to within 34,649,589 miles of Earth and will be (next to the moon) the brightest object in the night sky. It will attain a magnitude of -2.9 and will appear 25.11 arc seconds wide. At a modest 75-power magnification

Mars will be easy to spot. At the beginning of Au-

gust it will rise in the east at 10p.m. and reach its azimuth at about 3 a.m.

By the end of August when the two planets are closest, Mars will rise at nightfall and reach its highest point in the sky at 12:30a.m. That's




pretty convenient to see something that no human being has seen in recorded history. So, mark your calendar at the beginning of August to see Mars grow progressively brighter and brighter throughout the month.



Was easy to get out and after some pulling and pushing by Perry and Jerry we managed to get close enough to get our gas. Thanks guys. Dockage is \$25.00 for the night....doesn't matter the size of the boat. (plus tax of course).



It was about a 9 hour trip from the club to the channel.

The next morning we left Ecarte Channel about 0745 and along the way we decided to do an overnighter to Tobermorry. We radioed the other guys to let them know and to see if they would like to do the same. They had decided to stop in Sarnia, so we said our goodbyes and hoped to see them while we were in the North Channel. Unfortunately, we never did meet up with anyone again this year. Next year we will have to be more specific about where to meet up. We had hoped to meet up with Dave and Mary Nantais and Lou and Bodo also...but that didn't happen either.


Well... we did our overnighter and it was great. Boat traffic and boat wake going under the Bridges in Sarnia made that part quite rough, but once out into Lake Huron things calmed down and we had a

nice trip. We put 'Otto' on and he did a wonderful job. We chuckled along the way. We had noticed that everytime Judge got near 'Otto' with his knife in his pocket it would throw 'Otto' into a frenzy. I guess it was messing up his internal compass. We arrived in Tobermorry around 1330 on Monday, July 4th. After showering and eating we just couldn't stay awake anymore ... so lay down for a much deserved nap. Tobermorry is a fun stop:...busy tourist town.

Well... we continued on the next morning heading to Killarney, but on the way it started to really blow a strong headwind, which slowed us down to 2 1/2 knots. At that speed we decided there was no point in fighting that wind and

stopped at Club Island. This is a really nice little anchorage to tuck into in situations like this, to stop for lunch and a swim... or even for no reason.. just to spend the night. It was our first time there. While we were there, Lex McCrindle from WYC came in also. He came over to the boat and we visited for a while. For you divers out there... there is a large schooner wreck at the back of this anchorage. We

spent a quiet night and in the morning headed to Killarney, where we re-provisioned and had our usual great tasting white fish and fries at the famous BUS.

We soon left for Snug Harbour...a nice and very safe anchorage ... well protected in case of storms. We spent the night there. We had originally thought we would head to Baie Fine, but our depth sounder was giving us a problem. The last place you want to be, is in the North Channel with an unreliable depth sounder. For some reason it always acts up when we are up there...must not like clean water. We changed our plans and headed to Little Current so we could purchase a cheap fish finder. It worked well the whole trip. Funny, on the way back our depth sounder worked fine (go figure). Since we

were spending the night in Little Current, Judge did some maintenance on the boat and I did the laundry. It's great... the laundry is right there at the dock. Makes life so much easier. Little Current is always a nice stop. Especially, the ice cream shop at the end of the dock!!!! Nice, clean showers, shops and now Internet and free WiFi at the Anchor Inn across from the dock. Everything is pretty handy here.

The next morning we headed to the Benjamins and to Crocker. Spent 3 days on the hook there and enjoyed it very much. This has to be my favourite spot to anchor. This year we had decided to spend less time traveling and more time on the hook. It was really great. From here we went to Gore Bay. It was amazing here....there are about 7 deer who have decided to just meander through the town at their leisure, eating the flowers and leaves as they pass. We were so surprised to see this. Of course... I didn't have my camera with me then. Darn...

Off again...this time to Bear Drop...another great place to anchor. If memory serves me well, this was also one of Jeurgen's favourite places, too. We thought a lot about him while we were there. In fact we thought a lot about all the people we had lost over the last year or so, from the club, as the sad news about Ross Byron had reached us. We spent another 2 or 3 days here...swimming and enjoying our new dinghy. From here we went to Meldrum Bay for lunch and to gas up, etc. There is a nice restaurant there.. just down from the dock. Has only been open since May. The name escapesme at the moment....but it was very nice....an old home. Rents rooms also. After a couple of hours here we got ready for our overnighter to Harbour Beach.

We had a great overnight trip to Harbour Beach. This is such a nice place, but is too shallow. We touched bottom all the way in and when we got to our slip we couldn't make it to the end without getting stuck. They have a courtesy van here and drove us into town. This was a festival weekend for them...when we arrived there were jet ski races going on. If you ever want something to do...head to "Al's Restaurant". It is well worth it. It is nothing fancy ... butttt the food is amazing. They have a buffet, for \$11.95 that doesn't stop. In fact... if they don't think you ate enough they will give you a container to take some home. They also give you a container to take desserts home. They must have 20 different kinds of desserts. The buffet was all you could eat .. of course... of crab legs (Judge must have eaten enough for 5 people), perch, white fish, etc. etc., even ribs. It was amazing!! We have never been to a buffet where you were allowed a doggy bag, never mind them encouraging it. This is certainly worth a stop if you can get in by boat....or...worth it even to drive.

It rained that night and was still raining in the morning. We waited until noon to leave, when it stopped raining. We again prepared for another overnighter to home this time. We really were very lucky....the lady of Lake Huron was very kind to us again. We thanked her as we entered the St. Clair River and continued on home.

We had a wonderful trip...met up with people we had met there last year...met new friends. Some of you are aware of the trip I will be starting soon and it was great to meet up with some who were already on the "America's Great Loop Cruise" and I hope to meet up with them again when I start mine. The weather was great for us...hot but not humid and a nice breeze to boot. Of course the wind was always on our nose when we were on the move. Hopefully, we will get more of you out cruising the North Channel with us next year. We returned home to LMYC on Sunday, July 17th at 0710. We chose, this time, to do more overnighters and spend more time in the NC. It worked well for us.



She promises to keep in touch and we will be reporting her progress through this newsletter.





After the party, it was quite a site to see many of the boats decorated with Christmas lights, adding to the evenings festive atmosphere.



## Wrecks of the Great Lakes





The Marshal F. Butters

Built 1882—Sank 1916

n Friday October 20, 1916, the Marshal F. Butters was one of 4 vessels that sank in the infamous "Black Friday Storm". The steamers James B. Colgate, the Merida and the schooner barge D. L. Filer went down in the storm taking 51 lives

Fortunately the 13 members of the Butters crew were saved by two passing freighters. A crew member of one of the passing freighters which came to aid the Butters

took this unique photograph. Usually during this period of time in history no-one is that far out to sea to take to record shipping disasters. It shows the Butters as she was about to sink southwest of Point Pelee near the international boundary between Canada and the United States

The Marshal F. Butters was the first vessel on the Great Lakes to be equipped with electric Running Lights.
