

Sandwich Mineral Springs

If you stand at the northern edge roughly where Sandwich and John Streets meet, and give your imagination free rein, you might pick out the traces of a shallow, north-south cleavage in the earth. This is all that remains of what was once one of the most popular natural tourist attractions this side of Niagara Falls. In its heyday it was a wide, peaceful, tree lined lagoon running from the river's edge to a mineral springs bath and spa at its head. It was magnet for thousands of visitors who came seeking a quiet weekend retreat or because they believed the warm mineral waters gushing from the earth could give relief from illnesses ranging from rheumatism to liver complications.

Development of this health spa was accidental and is one of the lesser known but more interesting aspects of life in late-19th century Sandwich. In 1866, when the search for oil was firing imaginations, a group of investors believed petroleum existed in Sandwich. A fund-raising meeting held at the Western Hotel brought in \$10,000, which was used to form the Sandwich Petroleum Oil Company.

Drilling equipment was installed and, although they didn't raise a pint of oil, at 900 feet they hit a rich, sulphurous mineral spring which turned out to be the next best thing.

Sightseers poured in and before townspeople realized what was happening, they were in the midst of a tourist boom. A hotel was built called Lagoon Park Hotel.

A canal was dug from the Detroit River; trees were planted along the banks and a boat livery opened, creating a popular weekend destination for family outings; boat fare from Detroit was 25 cents return. Some estimated that 20,000 people would arrive on a Sunday.

The springs drew huge crows until about 1889 when the springs lost their allure. The hotel and bath house were taken down and the lagoon silted in.
