From the Vice-Commodore





prepare for the next day's event, the Children Christmas Party.



you there!



Barbara and Manfred Update

Date: Fri, 18 Dec 1998

Hello to all of you from the Virgin Islands! It has been a while since I send out a message this way. Many of you know that we had decided to go off shore via Bermuda to the Virgins instead of going down what is known as the Thorny Path. We had enough of the ditch and wanted to do some sailing, after all St. Pauli is a sailing vessel! In Orienthal, NC we had called our friend Ron Stuebing from Amherstburg and asked him if he was interested to come down and come with us. It did not take long for him to come aboard. Many times we have been together back home and talked about this trip in the winter months and looked at all the charts and dreamed about this adventure. Now it was for real and we were happy to have Ron aboard.



On November 8th., "St. Pauli" and "La Boatique" left Orienthal and went to Beaufort, North Carolina from where we left the very next morning to go offshore. We had to motor again! Not enough wind to fill the sails! As it turned out we had to do so a lot and could not believe it! Even crossing the Gulf Stream was not hard. Pete and Sue were in sight of us at most of the times. We had seen dolphins playing around the boat and Manfred even caught a fish while we were sailing. But we could not identify the catch and decided to let him g! Every afternoon at 15:00 hours Ron made contact with Herb Hilgenberg in Canada and we listened to his weather forecast for the region we were in at the time. Herb is a great help to every sailor who seeks his guidance. All you have to do is to give him your position in latitude and long and he reads you the weather charts and tells you to beware of storms and squalls in your area. Luckily we did not have any to avoid any. It was decided that we head for Bermuda since we had to do a lot of motoring and our 50 gal of fuel would not be sufficient to go straight to the Virgins. The day we arrived in Beaufort we went ashore and had bought a chart from Bermuda just in case. Boy, were we happy to had done so now! As it turned out we had bought the very last one and Pete who came to the store later could not get the detailed one of Bermuda.

By Thursday Nov. 12, we were 120 nautical miles away from our destination and we just played with the wind and proceeded slowly because we did not want to arrive in St. George in the dark. The north end of Bermuda has an extensive reef. Pete and Sue decided to go ahead of us but as it turned out we got into Customs at the same time the next morning! They had anchored out for a few hours during the night and were rested as they came in . We had made it, and our very first offshore voyage with 506 miles was under our keel!! It took us 5 1/2 days to do so and we were proud and happy to have solid ground under our feet again

The Island is very small but pretty. But very

expensive to buy anything. Pete and Sue went to the Yacht Club and we decided to lay along the wall without any charge. The next day Manfred changed the oil and then we walked around the town to go sightseeing .People are very friendly! Ron even took a bus trip around the Island on Sunday. Sue and I walked around the northern edge and visited some beaches and saw all the colourful fish swimming in the crystal clear water.

Then we walked into the Yacht Club and I looked around to find our burgee. There it was! Pinned up underneath the ceiling by

Dave Evans, a member of LMYC, our Club.


He had done a race many years ago and was very successful in doing so! I guess that we were the second members from LMYC

to set foot on their premises.

Not long after I had gotten back to our boat another surprise was in store for me. We had some local visitors! Our son in law John has relatives living on the Island in Pembroke and his mother had called them from Canada and told them were we where located and the came out to greet us. It was like meeting our relatives and I felt sorry for Manfred not being there as he and Pete went to have some fun on their own at " White Horse", a local Pub .But we

were invited to come to their place another day and we had a

good time together and met the whole family.



head for the Virgins. By 12:30 we had checked out at customs and were on our way! This time we had more then 900 miles in front of us. The sea was very choppy and the ride not too comfortable. " La Boatique" was among 4 other boats which had left the harbour and within 3 hours after, we did

not see anybody else and the only contact was by VHF.

We sailed and motor sailed for the next 8 days. At times we had the mainsail reefed and then we had almost 2 full days of nothing and we just had the motor running in low rpm (to conserve fuel) and keep us on course. Our daily entertainment was calling in to the Water Net in Missisauga and in the afternoon to Herb with our respective positions. But then at one night we were hid suddenly by a squall and all hell broke loose! We had winds of more then 40 knots and it blew off our Windex from the masthead. Our Canadian flag got chewed up by the propellers of the wind generator too. The rain came horizontally at us and we were busy getting the sails secured. It was only for a brief moment but I was scarred! I guess this is OFFSHORE and not only a quiet sail on Lake Erie! I was glad to have Ron aboard then I was not of much help at that time. It hid us again a few days later but then I coped with it much better!

Manfred was able to catch Dinner for us again one day. This time it was a Black Fin Tuna. It tasted

very good!

The days went by and we were longing to set foot on shores. Sleeping and cooking at sea was uncomfortable at times and fatigue was coming on. We had not seen another sail boat and even contact on VHF with other boats was impossible. Ron made contact with different merchant ships which had crossed our bow but that was it! At one time La Boatique was 90 miles away from us, as we found out through Herb.

We sailed as far East as Longitude 60 and they went down on "Highway 65". The other boats heading the same way were either farther to the east or in between. We had to watch out for a Low

hanging over the Caribbean and to avoid it we headed more easterly.

But then finally during the early morning hours on Friday Nov. 27, we saw the Islands and were heading for Tortola in the British Virgins. We anchored in the bay . Manfred and Ron pumped up the dinghy and by 12:30 we had cleared Customs and had our first local meal at a restaurant. After 9 days and 946 miles we deserved a reward!!


We stayed in Tortola for a few days and on Sunday we were going over to Norman Island to look around and maybe find Pete and Sue. We tried calling on VHF but to no avail. We had lost contact

with each other and we were eager to find each other again.

We did! As we returned to Tortola we were called by Virgin Radio and as I answered I talked to Pete. They were waiting for us in St. Thomas, US Virgin Islands about 25 miles away.

It was nice to hear them and to know from each other that we had arrived safely.

We stayed in Tortola for 2 more days and then motor sailed over to St. Thomas. We made fast to the wall and reported to Customs which is very easy. Not long after we tied up, the Harbour Patrol showed up and collected. We stayed at the wall for 2 nights and after Ron had left we anchored in the bay near La Boatique and are still here at this time.




Every day there are different cruise ships nearby and this is a shopping mecca for everyone with enough money. Everything is duty free here and no tax! The city is interesting and we took many different buses to drive around the Island. We also have seen friends of ours which we had met in Charleston, South Carolina 2 years ago and who live here now. Lee spotted us, as we were laying on the wall downtown and picked us up one night to go to his place and have dinner together. Now we have ample time to relax and take it easy and get used to this "Lifestyle"

We went by dinghy to the beach and did some snorkeling. The water is warm and so clear. During the first 10 days of our stay we had lots and lots of rain and winds howling through the anchorage mostly at night around 30 miles per hour. But this is a good holding ground for the anchor and we are secure. This Friday evening there is a Festival at Main street which will be closed off to traffic. We will be listening to steel bands and see all the activity. Maybe by Sunday we will leave here to head over to Christmas Cove nearby and then to John's Island. The Seven Seas Association which we belong too, have a Christmas Gathering on Maho Bay on Christmas Day and every boat will bring a dish for potluck dinner. It should be interesting to meet other sailors.

From there we will spend some more time in the BVI namely Virgin Gorda, Jost van Dyke and others before heading south into the Leeward and Windward Islands after the holidays.

Well dear friends, this will bring me to the end of my letter. Manfred and I wish that you will have a Merry Christmas and also a very good new year! All the best to your respected families.
