





Essex Country PHRF And You

I.C. PHRF is Essex County's PERMORMANCE, HANDICAP RACING FLEET. It has handled ▲ handicap racing for the County's Lake Erie, Detroit River and Lake St. Clair sailors for well over two decades. Essex County PHRF is a recognized member fleet of US. Sailing PHRF. As an affiliate, Essex County PHRF pays \$250.00 US annually for our local fleet of eighty to one hundred certified boats. This affiliation enables us to share in the wealth of performance data and related information that each of the many member fleets is required to submit to US Sailing PHRF on a yearly basis. It includes all Canadian Fleets, since the Canadian Yachting Association has no similar governing body. This voluminous information and the valuable input of your local handicappers form the basis of performance handicap racing. It allows you to race in organized club races, local regattas and major events such as the Mackinaw Races etc.

Well you say, "Big Deal!" Where do you fit into the picture?

Let's say that you are new to racing your boat at LMYC. You don't have a spinnaker or have one but no crew to fly it? No problem, "Sail Jog on Monday evenings" Sail "What?" Jog = Jib or Genoa or some times called



JAM = Jib and Main. Since not all boats are created your boat (not you) will be given a handicap. You will be racing in a handicap class. LMYC, like all local sailing clubs has two handicappers/measurers, Chris Barron or Juergen Hendel who will have to "measure" your boat, sails, etc. issues and keeps on file a measurement certificate. Said certificate remains valid until modifications are made to hall, appendages, rig or other measured items. They will fill you in on other details. Their fee will be \$15.00. Your boat will now receive a handicap or "PHRF number". If your boat is of a type already handicapped by Essex County PHRF and shows no deviation from a standard or "base" boat, it receives it's handicap instantly. This "number" is expressed in sec/nautical mile. Boats racing in Jog or Jam classes may get additional credits for furling systems and solid propellers etc. "Unmeasured" boats will be assessed a 10 sec/nautical mile penalty, unilaterally anywhere! Get measured. It is a requirement for LMYC Races. If your boat is not a "base" boat listed on Essex County PHRF's roster its panel of Handicappers will handle your case. Essex County PHRF's constitution/by laws govern their procedures and class rules and they will assign this handicap.

All boats racing in the spinnaker classes must be registered with EC PHRF by paying dues of \$20.00 annually. This registration of their certified boat allows them to race anywhere under the PHRF system and locally to vie for BOAT OF THE YEAR and other annual awards.

Many rating systems have come and gone, some complex, some expensive and some both. Most rely on velocity prediction programs, expensive measurement procedures etc. and all a bit of a pain for the casual racer, even the gung-ho racers that may not opt for a one-design racing boat. PHRF has endured because of its simplicity and low cost and it offers great racing on many levels. Very little is ever perfect and most good things are created by hard work, in PHRF's case by volunteers.

So if you want to race your boat it is Essex County PHRF! Get involved; it's a big bang for your buck! It offers spirited racing on the water and interesting discussions around the bar before and after.

Chris's first love affair with boating occurred in the late 80's when Bob Bingham uncle of Chris invited him for a race/sail in Grandpa PHRF. The two of them raced and won and from that moment on Chris was hooked.

Over the years Chris has owned two sailboats, his first a very slow Edel 540. His current vessel is Sunkist a Mirage 26 which was purchased in 1993.

Chris married Jessica in 1996 and has two children Abbie 5 and Noah 3.

Chris became a member at LMYC in 1994 and during the years has held numerous positions. Chris became secretary in 2001, Vice-Commodore in 2002, and is presently the current Commodore.
