


M erry Christmas and a Happy New Year






Sunday Breakfast


Happy Retirement

Adam Prettyman Update



This is an email from Adam Prettyman, club member who is on an adventure of a lifetime.

Hello down there,

I made it! The people here are really cool and I am the youngest one up here.

It is very cold and at the moment it is snowing. The hours are pretty long. We start work at about 7 depending on what we did the night before and work until 5 or so (It's pretty open as long as you put in a good days work. With this group it's just like party central)

We spent all day bringing 10"x6"x24' planks (that are at least 1000-1500 lbs each) into the belly of the ship through a hole we cut in the side of the hull with a chain saw.

The shipwrights are planking the bottom and what a job. I can't see us meeting the deadline because right now the ship is completely striped.

We are hoping to have the sealings replaced in the next three weeks and that's what I'm working on. The sealings are the inside layer of the hull that the ballast sits on.

That's right, even the thousands of lbs. of ballast are out. There are only seven of us working on the ship now and that's the whole crew.

A lot of these people don't even know the basic knots and have only been on board the project for 4 months or less. Beer only costs 1.00 if you are a local. I became a local my first night here.


There are only 4 stores that are open and two gas stations. I think we have one of the only pool tables in the whole town and the people that live down the road have a pinball machine.

The only place I can send e-mail from is from the bar across the street from the house we are staying in.

HMS Detroit Update



The HMS Detroit is being built at Hike Metal Products in Wheatley. The ship is 132 feet from bow to stern and 207 feet from bow-sprit.

The 1.2 million dollar hull, the first phase of a 4.4 million three-phase project to create a replica of the Amherstburg built 1813 warship, which is expected to be completed around June 2002.

The ship will weigh 160 tons and will be lifted by

two cranes for a lauanch into the harbour at Wheatley. It will then be loaded with 145 tons of scrap steel and 75 tons of concrete to serve as ballast while it is being towed to Amherstburg. In Amherstburg phases 2 and 3, involving interior work and fitting the ship with its three masts, 12 sails and associated rigging. It is estimated it will take 20,000 man hours to complete the project. The ship is steel hulled and will be wood clad above the waterline and painted black and yellow to reflect the original colours of the Detroit, the largest ship built at the Amherstburg's Navy Yard and the flagship of the British Fleet during the War of 1812. The Detroit will be a unique ship because it is going to be a passenger vessel with 37 berths, a crew of 16 and capable of carrying around 110 people.



Trim The Tree Extravaganza









Some members went outside to continue in the tradition of firing off flares to bring in the new year.







Winter Safety



After a very warm fall, winter is now upon us. Here are some facts which some members may find useful concerning outdoor activity.



How to determine the Wind Chill Factor

If you are good at math, here is your answer:

 $T(wc)=.081 \times (3.71 \times \text{sqrt}(V) + 5.81 - 0.25 \times V) \times (T - 91.4) + 91.4$

Where T(wc) is the Wind Chill in degrees F, V is the Wind Speed in MPH, and T is the temperature in degrees F.

All you have to know is that wind chill is a measure of how much heat your body loses when you factor in the temperature and wind speed.

The wind chill factor was invented by two Antarctic explorers in the late 1940s. They experimented with how fast water freezes in certain wind speeds and temperatures, and then compared that to the rate that the body loses heat.

Here is a table that will help you determine what the wind chill is. All you need to know is the temperature (in F) and the wind speed.


Kristen at present is training to hopefully join the Canadian Young Riders group which will allow her to advance to other groups representing Canada.


Andrea has recently purchased a new horse which to quote her is, 'eloquent and athletic'. She would like to advance this horse and rider to clinics to assist in their advancement.



a kid growing up in Amherstburg along the Detroit River, Bob got his love of boating fooling around with old rowboats and other discarded wrecks. Often the bottoms were made leak proof by melting tar from the local tar bed near present day Brunner Mond boat basin. One of Bob's favorite boats during that period was a make shift punt with a bow attached with gleeing shark teeth painted on it. Power was supplied by oars, or from an old 1928 3horse power OMC outboard. Strangely enough this early affliction to shark like craft continues today. Bob has had his Shark Gringo for over 30 years! This has enabled him to lay claim to ownership of the same boat for the longest period of time within his club. Catching the sailing bug from Carl Durham back in the early 60's on board
