




Port to Port Race





After the ceremony everyone was invited back to the clubhouse to enjoy a small feast which all club members donated. The food was excellent and many went back for seconds.



Aboard A Precision 28



This spring. I was enrolled in a ASA (American Sailing Association) course for Basic Keelboat Sailing and Basic Costal Cruising. The courses given by accredited ASA instructors is approved by the National Association of State Boating Law administrators and recognized by the US Coast Guard. As a beginner sailor, I had the experience of a life time (so far). The particular course instructor Mr. Don White was hard, patient and open minded. The St. Petersburg Yacht Charters Mr. Page Obenshain matched up my friend Mark Cowen and myself with a true sailor, who drilled us and tested us and God knows has stories to tell about the Canadians who want to learn to sail.

We boarded a 28' Precision, three of us, one sailor and 2 want to be's to head out to the Gulf of Mexico. We were greeted with 12-15 knot winds and seas to 6', warm sunny conditions and a wonderful experience to unfold. We got long hours of studding parts of a sailboat, items on a sailboat, terms to use, identify points of sail and Inland Navigational Rules. Our days consisted of waking early in the morning to study for the day's exam, which we wrote at 9:00. Oh yea' knots and more knots. After exams, the day would consist of discussion, instruction and sailing figure 8's, Triangles and sailing & establishing a course line, learning and studying charts and of course the most important SAFTEY. Don would constantly quiz us on Safety, terms (I am sure "Ready About" has a hole burnt into my psyche), and if that didn't shake us, he would let us know what the duties of a skipper are and also the crew.

I think Mark and I excelled in the man over board training, as we were sure we would have to pick up one another eventually. Setting the anchor in different depths and the constant drills to dock and stop under sail made for along tough day. Sore and tired, we would take turns preparing meals, as the other would study and quiz back and forth the day's lessons learnt. One thing that Don exclaimed was that those Canadians sure know how to eat. Mark and I got with Just Jeff's Catering on Howard Ave between the mall and Cabana, who worked with us develop a day-to-day menu, and he then prepared ready to serve meals, which he froze and we brought with us. The foods were fantastic; all meals took 8 min. to prepare and only had very few dishes to clean. One night's meal consisted of Veal Medallions, garlic mashed potatoes, and vegetables, while a side of Seafood Pasta rounded out the meal. The food was so exceptional; I thought Don was going to invite his wife aboard for dinner on the last day. The meals used up very little fuel, and we would have never eaten any better in a good restaurant

This experience has thus far been the best time that I have been sailing, and now when Bob Bingham yells "Ready About". I'll know what he means. I will be preparing for the next course, which is Bareboat Chartering and Costal Navigation, and look forward to getting with Done White and SPYC till I pass the Offshore Passage-making course.



he cadets have been doing sail training at LMYC since the mid-80's, thanks to the unfailing support of the club and its members. Without this support, local sail training would be next to impossible as there are no sites available for this non-profit organization. Every cadet who has passed through has been grateful for the opportunity.

On Jun 05 we tested 17 cadets and on Jun 06 we tested 14 more for a total of 31 successful White Sail 1 candidates. We almost beat our record of 37 set a year ago. The weather was extremely cooperative.

On Jun 12,13, we had 14 White Sail 2 candidates. This level requires more on water time to achieve an understanding of basic sailing skills. Due to some iffy weather, keeping in mind these are beginners and not allowed to skipper in over 10 K winds, we managed to accomplish most of the on water testing. They still require more on water time to complete their level testing. We have made arrangements to run a sail clinic 26-30 Jul during the day to complete this.


