





LMYC Bylaw Amendments



The following are the proposed Amendments which were approved by the Executive and the Past Commodores. These amendments will be presented at the next general meeting to be voted on. Bring your Bylaws Booklet

Bylaw amendments

- 12(g) for unworked hours. When a club member, in good standing, reaches the age of 60 and has been a Full member for at least 25 years, that member no longer needs to record work hours.
- 12(j) Winter haulout and storage will begin October 1st and must be completed by November 15th.

Delete 12 (f)

- 12.(i) at the owner's expense. Boats still on club property after May 15 will be charged a daily fee, set by the executive on an annual basis.
- 17.(d) Temporary dockage may be available at the club for those full members who do not have a well there. The first 3 days will be free then a prorata on a daily basis of regular docking fees. Members who store here may have 10 days to prepare or de-commission their boat.

As a new Full member of LMYC I acknowledge a three (3) year probationary period. During this period the executive will review my standing and membership continuance based on my involvement in club functions, work hours, meeting attendance, use of our facility, and maintain membership in good standing and compliant with all club bylaws. Failure to satisfy the above criteria will, at the executive's discretion result in my membership being revoked.

If during the 3-year probation period, a membership is revoked, the initiation fee may be returned (prorata) at the discretion of the executive.

This goes under 3.(c) But is to be part of the new Full membership application

Valentine's Party





Darts at LMYC




he sport of darts is unique in several ways: the equipment required to play is reasonably inexpensive, a relatively small amount of space is required to play, and special clothing is not required. Age, gender, size and physical strength/endurance have almost no effect on a player's ability to do well. These factors combine to make darts the appealing and popular game it is today at LMYC.




Darts at LMYC began officially in 1978 and when the game was first played some unnamed club members at that time "erroneously thought it to be an invasion by woodpeckers' (LMYC newsletter 1978)

Presently 20 members and friends attend the weekly event at LMYC, which consists on two main types of games Cricket and 701. Teams are made up each Wednesday with the members in attendance. The rates to play are very reasonable. 25 cents to play and if you lose you have to contribute 10 cents. If a player happens to achieve a score greater than 100 all in attendance have to contribute 10 cents.

There is still a change to become involved. Darts are held at the clubhouse every Wednesday evening until approximately 1 week before Launch Day. On the last day of darts the members and guests have a party and present awards for the achievement acquired during the winter months.





Movie Night at LMYC






LMYC Members viewing the Video

We arrived in Brisbane on the hottest day of the year (113 degrees).




