

#### LaSalle Mariner's Meeting Update

(<u>Please note</u>: This summary is a reflection of the editor's memory and is not intended to be the official minutes. If you are not sure please check with the minutes)

The meeting on April 16<sup>th</sup> began with Rina Bodri from the Telephone Response Center at Canada Customs to speak to the club members about Small Vessel Reporting Procedure. She summed up the procedure as follows:

#### WHO HAS TO REPORT?

the master, owner or operator of the vessel.

#### WHEN DO YOU REPORT?

 immediately upon entering or returning to Canada (all passengers and goods must remain aboard until they are released by customs).

#### WHERE DO YOU REPORT FROM?

from a designated reporting station/marina.
 Customs will not accept calls from other locations. These designated marinas will have a Revenue Canada Customs sign posted.

#### WHAT DO YOU REPORT?

vessel number, registration, and name;
 name, citizenship, date of birth, and country of residence of each person on board; (People who are not Canadian or U.S. citizens must have valid passports or travel documents.)

#### AMOUNT OF PURCHASE WHEN ABROAD

- 1 day no value
- 24 hours you are allowed \$50.00
- 48 hours you are allowed \$200.00
- 8 days you are allowed \$700.00

Rina Bodri from Canada Customs also stated what happens when you do not report properly when you are returning back to Canada.

- first non-report you will be issued with a warning letter.
- second non-report you will be issued a \$100.00 fine.
- third non-report you will be issued a \$200.00 fine.
- fourth non-report you will be issued a \$400.00 fine.

- TREASURER (Yvonne McRobbie) reported that members who are delinquent in paying their bills are costing the club money. Member's dues, and costs owing to the club must be paid prior to launch.
- <u>CLUB BURGEES</u> still available from the Treasurer for \$20.00
- <u>SOCIAL DIRECTOR</u> (Mary Ellen Mangile) is looking for assistance in preparing for the "Fitting Out Breakfast" which replaces LMYC annual Launch Breakfast.
- Mary Ellen Mangile also announced that she
  has an opportunity to take part in a sailing
  venture from Toronto to Newfoundland and will
  be temporarily handing the position to her
  husband Judge Mangile until her return.
- RACE DIRECTOR (Donald Beneteau)
   Reviewed information brought up at the Racers' Breakfast held earlier this month. He also stated that at this time Shakedown would still be at Put-in-Bay.
- <u>GROUNDS</u> (Fred Bolton) stated that he has been holding off because of forth coming dredging, but the front area of LMYC should be addressed. Work parties will be Tuesday Evenings 6:00-8:00 and Saturdays 10:00-12:00. This is an excellent opportunity to get your work hours in.
- <u>VICE-COMMODORE</u> (Bob Reaume) stated that
  if members are interested in getting work hours
  in to please call him. There are many projects,
  which are in dire need to be done.
- POLICE BOAT AT LMYC The town of LaSalle has had a 26-foot powerboat donated to them from the RCMP. This boat along with others will patrol the Detroit River seeking out Speeders and Alcohol violators. This boat was in need of a home. The members discussed all aspects of having this boat at LMYC and docked on the wall. The vote was taken and passed to have the boat stay a LMYC free of charge for this coming summer and if they wish to stay for a second season a charge per foot will be assessed. This charge is the same rate as LMYC members.
- HARBOUR MASTER (Ralf Fiedler) a vote was taken to suspend the May 15th Launch Day for all boats to be in the water until next year. Some members do not wish to have their boats launched this year and wish to keep their boats in Dry Land Storage. Rate to be charged is the same as Winter Storage. Vote was taken and passed on both accounts.
- <u>ILYA ANNUAL MEETING</u> Mary Ellen Mangile and Judge Mangile attended the conference.

- Some of the highlights of their meeting are as follows:
- 1. Water is very low at Put-in-Bay
- 2. Dredging is being done there.
- 3. Barges will be installed in harbour to assist in rafting.
- 4. More mooring balls to be installed.
- 5. Lonz Winery will be closed this year. The owner has died and presently Put-in-Bay is attempting to purchase the property.

Also, Ladd's Marina is also expecting to lose approximately 1/3 of their dockage due to low water.



Then you walk across the porch at LMYC and pass through the door, you can sense this is no ordinary breakfast experience.



Your order is taken within minutes and shortly you are served a huge platter of eggs, ham, harsh browns and toast. You have to butter and make your own toast.




Those participating in the event were allowed to sample the 10 chilis and then cast their ballot on their choice. After much deliberation the winners were announced.
