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
From the Commodore and Vice-Commodore



Colchester Harbour Entrance Unsafe



The following article appeared in the Windsor Star Wednesday, March 26, 2003 Star reporter Gary Rennie The following is a summary

Avid boaters and town officials say the federal government botched the design of the armourstone breakwall almost two decades ago, leaving the harbour entrance more exposed than protected from prevailing southwest winds.

"It gets pretty scary when you get tossed around in the entrance," says Levin LaPorte, a Colchester resident who has docked his 22 foot at the harbour the last five years. Two boats in the entrance at the same time are risking a collision in rough weather, he says

"I've never seen anyone hit the breakwall, but I've seen them get stuck in the mouth," said LaPorte.

The design of the breakwall appears to help currents along the beach funnel silt and debris into the harbour entrance, he said.

Even on a boat docked in the harbour. It's best to keep a tight grip on your drink when the winds are blowing right, LaPorte said.

"The waves will come right through the har-bour"

"The entrance to the harbour basin is unsafe and therefore not conducive to attracting transient boaters and tourists," said Watsa. "It's narrow, shallow and vulnerable to the open lake."

The town hopes to convince the feral government toput some money into moving the breakwall and changing the harbour entrance. No cost estimates have been done.

The tow operates a 128 berth marina inside the harbour and has enough demand to add another 70 berths if the breakwall can be moved further out to cre-

ate more space.

The silt build-up in the entrance forces the town to do an annual dredging just to keep the harbour open. Current low water levels are another reason to move the breakwall further out.



I-LYA Report

This years guest speaker was from the US Coast Guard Cleveland branch. Topic was home land security. Since 911 the Coast Guard is now part of the Home Land Security force and many of their roles have changed. One very important duty they have is to patrol approximately 9,500 miles of shore line in the Great Lakes, and they are asking all boaters for their help on identifying anything suspicious, we may come upon during our travels.

Bay Week Entry Forms have been mailed out to past participants, any one that has not received one by now should go to the I-LYA web site and get it there, they also have a list of races for the year.

This year we will only have C Dock and possibly A Dock for overflow. There was some discussion about C Dock it seems it can get a little ruogh there, and we should be sure to bring extra fenders.

New racing rules were added for the cruising class, just to keep out ringers. I will post a copy of these on the board in the clubhouse also a copy to race director and EC-PHRF.

Newly introduce and highly recommended was an automatic race signaling device, which also gives the race committee warning on when to raise, and lower the flags, along with the start sequence. No more watching a timer, fumbling with the flag, the horn, and instructions all at the same time. The cost on the unit demonstrated was \$500.00 US. Information on this can be seen in the US SAIL Web Site under running races. I have not looked yet. There seemed to be a lot of interest at our club on this item, some discussions went on after our general meeting.

There were no new clubs added to the I-LYA group this year and no new applications, in the past it seemed at least one or two new clubs were added each meeting.

Windsor Power Squadron Boating Seminar

A safe boating seminar was held on April 10, 2003 at the Sportsman's Club on Dougal Avenue beginning at 7:00 pm. Several LMYC club members were in attendance This was a good review of Boat Etiquette and Safety. The following is a short summary that some members might find interesting.

New Rules for lifejackets and PFD

- Law provides boats to be equipped with a Canadian approved PFD or lifejacket of an appropriate size for each person on board except for any infant who weight less than 9 kg or any person whose chest size exceeds 140 cm
- Lifesaving cushions are not accepted as an approved flotation device.
- Be aware that it is difficult to put on a PFD in the water. Panic can contribute to the danger. Teach children to become comfortable with their PFD, in the water.

Check the life jacket or PFds for Fisheries and Oceans Canada approval. Note than US Coast Guard approved lifejackets do not meet the requirements on Canadian boats, except for US residents visiting Canada.

Inflatable PFDs

- Worn while in an open boat, or worn while on deck or in the cockpit or be readily available to persons below deck of a vessel with a cabin.
- Persons weighing less than 36.3 kg and children under 16 years of age are not permitted to wear inflatable PFDs

Pouch type PFDs are only permitted for rowing and paddling activities but no inflatable is approved for use in white water activities.

Canadian Customs as a Summary

Your boat is considered to have entered the United States if you have:

- Docked, moored, or tied off in foreign waters
- Anchored in foreign waters; or
- Come into physical contact with another vessel whether in foreign or Candian waters, and either vessel requires customs clearance.
- All passengers must remain on the vessel until customs has cleared it.
- At the time of this meeting April 10, 2003 the US is under Code Orange and thus no I-68s, have been issued under this alert.

Operator Competency Requirements

This applies to operators of pleasure craft fitted with a motor and used for recreational purposes

- All operators born after April 1, 1983 must have proof of competency by September 15, 1999
- All operators of craft under 4 m in length, including personal watercraft by September 15, 2002 All operators by September 15, 2009

Proof of Competency can take 1 of 3 forms

- 1. A pleasure craft operator card
- 2. Proof of having taken a boating safety course prior to April 1, 1999

A completed rental boat safety checklist

The best way to bet proof of competency is to take an accredited course and successfully completing the test. Experienced boaters also have the option of taking this test without first completing the course.

Speeding and Liquor infractions where discussed


- The best reminder for boater if they are able to drink on board they must follow the following criteria ESP Eating Facility, Sleeping Facility, and Potty Facility and must be at anchor or at a dock not drifting.
- The fine for having open alcohol on board which is not properly secured is \$205.00 and does not necessarily apply just to the captain. The fine may also be directed to the passengers as deemed by the officer in charge.


launch their boats as a




community effort. Members would arrive early and leave late. A breakfast and usually a lunch was provided for the members in attendance.
