



Attention Boat Owners

Transport Canada would like to inform pleasure craft owners that starting on April 1, 2006, you can apply for a Pleasure Craft Licence at all 320 Service Canada Centres across the country. For the location nearest you, visit www.servicecanada.gc.ca or call 1-800 O-Canada (1-800-622-6232) TTY 1-800-926-9105

Please craft of 12m or less and powered by an engine of 10 hp (7.5 kW) or more must display a licence number. This number allows search and rescue personnel and other agencies to identify boats quickly in emergencies.

AS OF APRIL 1, 2006, Canada Border Service Agency will no longer be issuing licences.

Pleasure Craft Licence formally 55E212345 Boat Documentation is now called Boat Registration.

Attention Boat Owners

On Friday, May 5, 2006 (6:00 p.m.) GIYC has scheduled an informational program titled "What every Boater should know about Nautical Law Enforcement".

On behalf of GIYC V/C John Clark, an invitation is extended to you and all LaSalle Mariners Yacht Club (L.M.Y.C.) members.

The following law enforcement agencies will provide representatives for the program: U.S. and Canadian Coast Guard, U.S. and Canadian Customs, U.S Border Patrol, Wayne County Sheriff, Ontario Provincial Police, and N.O.A.A. Each agent is requested to provide a brief description of their agency's mission as it applies to recreational boaters, under what circumstances an interactions can occurr between each agency and the boater and what we might do to minimize the pain of contact. In addition, the agents are encouraged to discuss new regulations and policies that apply to boaters.

This program should be of great interest and benefit to L.M.Y.C. members who I am certain will find it both informative and entertaining. To my knowledge, this is the largest assembly of agencies from the two countries to address boaters on a single program.

L.M.Y.C. members, like GIYC members, make frequent excursions into the other country's water. Vessels may even be moored so the boaters can avail themselves of nutrition, hydration and fellowship. Consequently, we have a greater exposure for interaction with a

governmental agent than many other boat club members.

Because of the strong interest expressed for the program, reservations are strongly recommended (734-676-0211). A buffet dinner will begin at approximately 6:00 p.m. The program will commence at 7:30 and will conclude by 10:00. This includes at least an hour allowed to Q and A.

As a fellow L.M.Y.C. member, I look forward to welcoming many of you to G.I.Y.C. whether you arrive by boat or auto.

She soon had a bridge deck and a cabin wall with hatch boards. We hoped this would make her less prone to sinking. Jeannie made cushions for the main cabin and I covered the hull repairs with a coat of orange paint – my racing colours. We were very excited to have our own boat!

Fellow motorcycle dealer, and long time member of La-Salle Mariners, Curly Ellis, encouraged me to join the LaSalle Mariners. Meetings were held at Ralph & Molly Allen's house on Lafferty Lane. (No Club property yet). Sailing, club racing and the friendships were great.

Wanting to introduce sailing to my motorcycle riding buddy, I invited Ted McCabe and his family to accompany myself and my family to Grosse Isle Yacht club for dinner on the boat. On a sunny Sunday, four adults and four children boarded our Viking for a leisurely sail down river. A steady breeze powered our wing on wing run. Approaching Grosse Isle, I was looking for the sunken bridge abutment and the marker. However, the water level was high that year and the maker- no where to be found. Boom!!! It found me. The boat which had been traveling at a good clip, stopped dead. The adults slid forward hitting the cabin wall and the kids inside piled up on the V-births. The boat turned on its side, sitting on top of the bridge abutment. The kids were crying and the crew were panicking as the water poured over the gummel into the non cockpit. Where in your sailing manual do you find instructions for sailing your boat sideways?

I quickly gathered the main sheet until I could reach the boom and held it up to the wind. This tipped the boat farther and she started to move. With the combination of the wind direction and the current, the Viking started to sail sideways. As the keel cleared the abutment, she righted and I grabbed the tiller and straightened her out. The sails filled again wing on wing and the Viking began sailing happily along again as if nothing had happened.

I steered the boat close to the Island ready to run her into land if she started to sink. Ted was instructed to lift the floor boards to check for water around the keel bolts. The bridge deck had kept the water in the cock pit - a little bailing and we were fine.

We sailed and raced the Viking 22 enjoyfully for eight years then the Catamaran came along. Now that's another story.
