Dennis Pare is running for Councillor for Town of LaSalle in the November Elections. Dennis a LMYC member


since 1985 and life long resident of the town of LaSalle is married, to Barbara (nee Terry) with 3

Trustee representing Sandwich West to the Essex County Board of Education. Two terms as Vice Chair and one as Chairman of the Essex County Board of Education.






River Rat Rally Reminiscence R R R

The Fourth Annual Rally is now history and it will be remembered as the most gentle, well, maybe not on the skippers nerves, but definitely it was the most summer like jaunt of all the four rallies. Halfway around the course, the winds

settled to blow out of the southerly quadrant. It had gone around the compass several times. I bet that mother natures's wheel of fortune had the GUNG-HO racers bite their nails. Add to that a couple of freighters and boats passing port to port in the bend at Ballard's Reef and you rarely had a dull moment! The finishing "Beep" from the ably manned Committee Boat "St. Pauli" left one feeling quite satisfied with just having had another go at the Old River in this rally of the mariners just a few short days from haulout.





reaching with blustery westerlies around this 13 nautical mile course to establish some pretty impressive elapsed times. Last years brisk northerly winds made it a true endurance course for the crews. In all, they have all been great outings. So, "Why not years ago?" was a question raised to this writer. It became apparent that unlike Old River Rats, some of the newer ones never wandered from the familiar boundaries of the Monday and Wednesday Night race courses. They had not circumnavigated Turkey Island, let alone leave the confines of the course of the Fighting Island Annual Regatta. And all this aided by the many new and additional navigational marks that now depict these channel is better than most highways. Twenty spars alone on the east side of Fighting Island!

Old River Rats had to "explore", Gunk-Hole, find their way around, which made them quickly familiar with the wiles of this great river. Comments like "Gee, I didn't know you could sail in that channel (Trenton), or "Is it deep enough?" Think of Mama Juda as a funny name. It certainly shows they had never been aground on its shoal! Just ask Red... Older rats spotted a large, bright neon sign marking the "Pier 500", shore side on the approaches to the Trenton Channel. In the early '60's' the "Pier" was a great watering hole and night spot and was purported to be the first scene of the Wet T-Shirt Contest. And thus the western channels are quite familiar to "Old" rats. Take a serious look at your river chart. This is an interesting waterway and you can definitely sail on it!

The course of the rally became obvious to everyone, and just two weeks before haulout seemed a logical date for rallying those that love to sail, enjoy brisk winds and weather and a good time after the "Sail" not "Race". There are no entry fees, no flags, but perhaps records and handicaps to substantiate bragging rights. So far we have had little trouble finding willing and able Race Committees.

To find the pace you choose is simply yours and it was this writers hope to attract the interest of the not so "Racy" part of LMYC, to join those that knew it would be great fun. HEH, it's OK to be called a "River Rat".

SEA CADET SAILING SCHOOL AT LMYC -- A Short History



Sailing Centres were originally started in Ontario in 1977. Sailing Centre #6 arrived in Windsor in 1979 a power safety boat, 5 aluminum Petrel class dinghies, and assorted safety gear. Under the command of Lt(N) R. Wood, it found its first home with HUNTER's boats at LaSalle Marina. During this time, sailing was an exercise in rigging boats. The heavy aluminum Petrels had to be unloaded from the trailer, completely rigged, and launched. At the end of the training day, it was all reversed. AGGIE's cadets could soon do this in record time.

Due to circumstances beyond our control, the Sail Centre was moved to Camp Tillicum for summer usage, and to Mississauga for one summer. When it was returned in 1983, LCdr. C. Dickson was the new Officer Commanding. He found a home for it at Cedar Island Yacht Club, near Kingsville. In 1984, due to the efforts of LCdr. R. Beresford, arrangements were made to sail from the LaSalle Mariners Yacht Club. This location was much better due to its closer proximity to Windsor, and to the facilities provided. We have been there ever since, enjoying the use of their facilities and the tremendous support of the members and the Club itself. In 1987, 3 new Echo dinghies were added to the fleet.

In 1988, Cdr. R. Beresford became the new Officer Commanding. Since safety is always a big consideration, efforts were made to increase the number of power safety boats. Through the support of the Windsor Branch Navy League, 2 older power boats were added, as well as I more dinghy, a Mistral, and through HMCS HUNTER, 2 Albacore dinghies were made available. As the skills of the cadets increased, they were able to train on the higher performance boats. For the first time in 1989, a



cadet from AGAMEMNON was qualified to CYA Green Instructor, and was able to test other cadets in the Basic Sailing Levels. Since then, a total of 5 have been Instructor qualified, with 1 currently on strength as a CIC Officer at Sail Centre #6.


The storage trailer was upgraded to a much larger trailer.

In 1994, Lt(N) S. Beresford took over command. DND replaced the Petrels with 4 Echoes, and the 2 older power boats were replaced with 2 new ones, more importantly 2 new ones with new reliable motors. The dinghy fleet has grown to include a Laser, 420, and the 3 Albacores previously on temporary loan from HUNTER.

In the time we have enjoyed DND support for sail centres, the cadets from AGAMFMNON, trained by the staff at Sail Centre #6, have had much success at Sea Cadet Regattas. In the 12 Flotilla (S-W Ont.) competitions, AGGIE has placed first 9 times, and second three times. In the 10 Provincial competitions, the teams have placed in the top half of the fleet, including 2 firsts, 1 second, and 3

thirds, qualifying in the top live to make up the team representing Ontario at Sea Cadet Nationals. August 97 Nationals, our team placed 14 out of 25, with Ontario achieving a third overall. In Sept 97, our teams placed 2nd and 6th out of 11, with the top two teams earning a chance at Provincials in June 98.

In 1995, with the introduction of a new Sea Cadet Training Syllabus, achieving CYA White Sail Levels I and II will be mandatory for rank promotions. The partnership between AGAMEMNON and the Sailing Centre #6 will be more



important than ever to help the Sea Cadets of AGAMEMNON achieve their goal.

This past summer, 2 cadets earned their CYA Green Instructor, 1 Silver VI, 2 Bronze V's and 1 IV. In addition, there were 9 White Sail III's and a large number of I's and II's. In the year 2000, every cadet on the deck at AGAMEMNON should have a sailing level. A goal for the Millennium

With the increase in the number of sail boats accessible to the area cadets, the usage in number of on the water hours has nearly tripled. The number of White Sail Levels issued is 5 times that of 2 years ago. The staff at Sail Centre #6 is motivated to excel and is dedicated to passing on their training to the next generation of cadets. Sailing is a skill that builds self confidence and self esteem. And it definitely teaches patience. All of these attributes will make better citizens in the long run, one of the goals of the Sea Cadet movement.


