

- And finally as our River Rat Race proves the most "Spirit de Corps".





Highlights of October 6th Haulout Meeting

Chris Barron Vice-Commodore presided, as Commodore Bob Ferguson was not present. Some highlights:

- ✓ Saturday cleanup 75 members were called and 6 people showed up. 35 yard bin was filled. Sea Cadets helped.
- ✓ Siding is in for shed, but still needs to be done.
- ✓ Fire Department cited club for violations concerning storage of volatile materials in clubhouse. Materials now moved to shed. Club will be re-inspected.
- ✓ Judge Mangile reported that plans to put wire around the clubhouse to keep geese off the property will be implemented shortly.
- Halloween Party coming up. If call up proves that attendance will be poor, party may be canceled.
- Ralf Fiedler reported that members should check cradles and make sure you have your name on it and indicating which is bow and stern.
- ✓ If you have two cradles on the property make sure you have your name on it.
- ✓ NO BOATS WILL BE WASHED IN THE SLINGS. Area becomes too messy for haul out crew. Boats will be washed where they will be stored.
- Don't wait too long to have boat hauled out. Water is shut off for the winter approximately the second Saturday in November. Note this date may vary will weather conditions.
- Many boats indicate that they wish to be in the first row for storage, so that they can be moved for repair. Sometimes this repair does not happen. Work order may be required if abused.
- Howard Porter donated a small compressor to fill tires on trailers and club equipment. Motor required.
- ✓ Old oil has been removed from club. No engine oil, anti-freeze etc. not allowed on prop-

- erty. Take your old oil home. It can be recycled.
- ✓ Burgees available for \$20.00 and decals for \$4.00. See Treasurer.
- ✓ COPY OF INSURANCE ON BOAT. FIRST PAGE. (Proof that your boat in insured) BOB MACKENZIE will be collecting. Due by the time you haul out your boat this Fall.

During the evening members and friends enjoyed fine food, fine wine and fine conversation into the wee hours of the night.














Jeff Williams -Arrow Mailing Canada









Jeff Williams Vice-President of ARROW mailingcanada located on 1415 Janette Ave in Windsor Ontario. Jeff Williams joined the publication staff of The Currents and will distribute our newsletters free of charge through his company. Many club members are not aware of Jeff's business and this is an excellent time to become familiar with its inner workings. Jeff has written a short account of how this business was formed.

I hear "What EXACTLY do you do again'?" with regularity, only to be repeated the first time they take a tour through our plant. To be sure, our business is rather uncommon, and rarely involves licking stamps. In brief we run an International Mailing House. As to what this is, I present the example of any Canadian holding a subscription to a US magazine, (Good Housekeeping, Sports Illustrated, etc.). Instead of each of these publishers mailing each individual copy first class international to the subscribers here in Canada, our services allow them to simply palletize the entire Canadian volume for us to pickup from anywhere in the US and import into Canada. We then presort, address & post on the domestic side, through Canada Post, to recipients nationwide.

This practice allows for faster, more consistent and less expensive Canadian delivery, even when including our costs. As well, our service is not limited to publications. Anything coming or going through the mail, including catalogues, junk mail, newsletters and product fulfillment is duriguer. It is also worldwide. The Royal Mail, Deutsche Post & Danish Post have all been clients. Check your mail. If you see an international piece with a Canadian postmark, it's likely us.

The sheer volume of it all is what surprises most people. In addition to being a mailing house of close to 20,000 square feet and 20 to 35 employees, we are our own Customs Broker, run our own trucks across the border, have exclusive fulfillment and package tracing software and operate a myriad of mailing list correction and presort software. We average about 15 to 30 pallets per day with our largest job ever being 13 truckloads for one mailing for BMG Music. We once did 8 truckloads of those AOL diskettes. Our newest client is Harlequin (Romance) Publishing, actually a Canadian company but fulfilling out of Buffalo, who distributes 800,000 books & book packages to Canada per year. Other clients include Huggies Diapers, LL Bean, Disney, World Almanac, Victoria's Secret, and the Playboy Catalogue amongst many others.


The next question usually comes in the form of: "How in the (-ahem-) did you ever get into THIS?" Well, as many of you know, my father (Bob Williams) has run a motorcycle dealership since 1967. In 1988, he was offered the Harley Davidson dealership in Windsor while at the same time being offered the opportunity to take over a mailing business being abused by the then current cocaine addicted and in debt owner. We couldn't do both. Although we never did take over the existing mail house, he did decide to start his own. Things were very tough as we later found that the other shop owner was in the practice of stealing postage and no potential client wanted anything to do with anybody in Windsor. Eventually we did get a single, but rather large client. . who eventually failed to pay for \$60,000.00 US of their bills. Then 6 months later my



father got into a motorcycle accident, which left him in the hospital for an entire year. Myself, just home from 7 months hitchhiking & sleeping creatively throughout Europe & the Middle East, still in University and singing for a punk rock band, got a (muchneeded) haircut to take the permanent helm of a business losing about \$13,000.00 monthly. Years of scrambling, the remortgage of Dad's house, the sale of two duplexes and a prime commercial building and the disintegration of the dealership later, we began to come out the other side.


Ten years hence, we purchased our current facility 1415 Janette Avenue which also houses my brothers' machine shop (Williams Machine Tool) and (the point of it all...) my Dad's TEAM ARROW Racing workshop featuring two bona-fide Bonneville top speed racing motorcycles including a 23 foot long streamliner.
