



Wednesday Evening is Dart League Night at LMYC. All members are welcome to attend. This is a great opportunity to meet members in a different venue.




Monday Luncheons



The boat he sailed on USA 39 Hull #08 finished 11th overall.


New Boat Owners

This is an update on Bob Reaume's condition as given by Tammi Pouget, Sue Ouellette's sister

Saturday October 30, 2004

They have been able to bring the oxygen on the ventilator from 75% down to 40% and Bob has been able to sustain that since yesterday. He remains completely sedated (A medicine they give him to sleep) and it sounds like they will still keep him like that for quite some time. There has been "slight" improvements on his chest x-ray in the last two days. Otherwise everything is the same. He's holding his own and the doctor reminds Sue that he is still critical. He is out of isolation as of yesterday. That was good news. The nurse told Sue that if she has any cards it would be a positive thing for Bob to wake up with them posted around his room. If you would like to tell the members to write out a personal card to Bob, they can either mail it to Sue or drop it in her mail box and she will bring them and post them in his room. He still can't have visitors, and it could still be weeks before he is off the ventilator.








ANNAPOLIS BOAT SHOW



"When I bestride him, I soar, I am a hawk, he trots the air, the earth sings when he touches it, the basest horn of his hoof is more musical than the pipe of Hermes, he is pure air and fire." William Shakespeare

No one illustrated this sentiment better than Andrea Bingham when she rode her gelding Montello to victory at the Western Ontario Trillium Dressage Championship hosted in London, Ontario on September 19th. Now that all the riders' scores from both the Western and Eastern Trillium Ontario Championships have been tallied, it is official that Bingham's total combined score is the highest, making her and Montello the Third Level Trillium Dressage Champions of Ontario. This winning team also captured the Third Level Freestyle Trillium Dressage Championship.

Amherstburg resident, Bingham is no stranger to equestrian achievements. She has won 5 trophies, over 20 medals and qualified to ride in the Royal Winter Fair at the young age of 16. Now more than 30 years later Andrea Bingham is the exceptional trainer of many new and experienced riders at Stonehaven Farm in Amherstburg. "During a lesson, when I complain that, Cara, (part Arabian mare) just can't do it, she trades places with me and in minutes, this 20 year old mare becomes animated and transforms into a collected, proud, athlete" says Kathryn Oppio one of Bingham's adult students. "Without a good instructor an operator error is usually blamed on the horse" Oppio admits. "She is an amazing athlete who has a profound passion for the sport, but, that does not make her the exceptional trainer that she is. She has the patience and teaching skills to work with many students at many different levels." Many Windsor area students travel to Stonehaven Farm once or twice a week for lessons with Bingham. Using Classical methods she trains both rider and horse to advance their skills in their dressage or hunter/jumper disciplines.

Dressage is the English discipline of riding where the rider uses the subtlest of body movements and pressures to communicate to the horse what direction, speed or maneuvers is being requested. The rider's athletic skills of balance and control have been compared to those of a Formula One Champion driver. The riding team performs in a 60m x 40m ring that has very specific co-ordinates and precise areas in which each horse and rider must perform the exact same exercises where Equine Canada's rules apply. In the Freestyle events the riders choreographs their own order of performing each skill all to music that changes in tempo to compliment the change in the gait and speed of the horse.

The River Rat Race held Sunday October 17, 2004 signifies the end of the sailing racing season. Over 20 boats were entered for this event at LMYC. The skippers meeting was held at 11:00 AM to inform racers of the course and any last minute changes. The main theme for this years race was NO FEES, NO PROTESTS, NO QUESTIONS. The race started at 12:00 noon with three divisions. PHRF "A", PHRF "B" and JOG.

The race this year a distance just over 13 nautical miles began at the usual Wednesday Night Start and proceeded South rounding Fighting Island and returning North rounding Fighting Island and then heading South between Fighting Island and Grassy Island finishing just North of the Widow's Walk at LMYC.



Put-in-Bay

n October 8th, a mixed crew of sailors from Blitz and Slo-poke headed to Put-In-Bay for the 2004 Fall Bay Regatta. Al Buliga and I delivered the boat Friday morning, while the rest of the crew came by ferry later that night. For most of us on board it was our first time sailing in this regatta, and we were all looking forward to squeezing in yet another weekend of racing before the season came to its official end later in the month. Registration was taken Friday night at The Boat House and we were happy to find that dockage was free to all racers from Friday till Sunday. Our first night was fairly typical, with visits to Frosties and the Roundhouse.

After a goodnights sleep, interrupted only by a 40 knot gale in the middle of the night, we awoke Saturday morning to sunny skies and 18 knots of breeze. With a set start time of 10:30 am, we were able to sleep in AND have a civilized breakfast before motoring to the starting area a mere 10 minutes from the harbour entrance. And speaking for myself, after years of suffering through the 7 am dock times of Bay Week, this was a much welcomed change of pace.

For this regatta, Blitz was put into PHRF A which consisted of a Shock 35, Tripp 33, Express 35 and another J/29. Being the "slow" boat in a PHRF class was a new experience for me, especially with the rating spread ranging from 69 to 111. Nevertheless, we were anxious to test our speed against the other J/29 "Send in the clowns", a boat that had previously collected some silverware at Key West Race Week.

Race 1 started without a hitch, and after a short windward leg we had a run to bell tower G1 followed by a beat to RN2 and a power reach back to the finish line, approximate course distance was 12.7 nm. Race 2 was a shorter affair, taking us around Rattle Snake and Green Island, then back to the finish. Although we were unable to track the finish times of the larger yachts, we were encouraged after beating our fellow J/29 in both races. Later that night we learned that we had had 2 very close races against the Tripp 33 "Kicks". They scored first in both races while Blitz took two seconds. Saturday night offered more partying, and for some reason, more gale force winds at three in the morning.

By Sunday the breeze had settled down to about 12 knots as we headed out for our final race. The race committee opted to send us once again around the short course. After a decent start and a good windward leg, we rounded Rattle Snake close to the leaders in our class. From Rattle Snake we had a very strong run to Green Island, making big gains on the two big boats in front of us. After another beat back to the finish, first place was ours followed by "Kicks" in second. In the overall standings Blitz took a second in class and fourth overall in the 32 boat fleet. After a few drinks at the dock we attended the awards ceremony, where we had come to be known as "the Canadians" (In my opinion, we represented our country well for the most part.) then headed home, either by sailboat or ferry. I think for all of us on board, and at least for me, this turned out to be one of the best regattas attended all season. We had a good crew on board which included Al Buliga, John Amyot Jr., Tapani Lintunen, Josh Lintunen, Adam Prettyman, Mark Styne and myself, the weather was nice, and by volume, more rum was consumed than coke. This is one regatta that will definitely be added to my schedule again next year.


