Protection for Launch

FROM THE HARBOUR MASTER:

Last year a low-grade electrical charge was found in both the north and south harbours. Such electricity in the water may cause galvanic corrosion with any metal, e.g. propellers, ladders, and may find its way into motor parts. For your protection, wherever your boat floats, a sacrificial anode is recommended. Zinc is the common material used in anodes for salt water but here in fresh water a magnesium anode is recommended as zinc forms an insulating oxide film over itself, especially in fresh water, that stops it from working.
