Re: Haulout and Such

The cradle was destroyed but the boat came away with just a small scratch at the waterline. Moir Crane had to return to our club and lift the boat putting it on a newly rebuilt cradle.

Again this year Mariners will hold the traditional Blessing of the Fleet.

The idea of the Blessing goes back to the days of the early Greek civilization who invoked the protection of the various gods over their vessels. In 1000 AD an

annual blessing was held to bless the fishing and commercial vessels. It continues in various forms.

It reached its height in 1897 when the 165 warships of the British Fleet were reviewed and blessed. Since then Yacht Clubs around the world have had their own services asking for safe season and a time to give thanks and remember deceased members.

Our Blessing is conducted by our honourary member, Fr. Stan Fraser, the Fleet Chaplain for our club. He brings many years of nautical and naval experience to the position. He served for 30 years in the Royal Canadian Naval Reserve; first as a navigator and the as Chaplain. He ended his career as a Commander and the Command Chaplain for the Naval Reserve.

He is well know in our community where he has resided for forty years. Fr. Stan served as the Rector of St. Andrew's Anglican Church for twenty years. In his role as Fleet Chaplain, among other services, he has performed weddings, officiated at funerals and visits our members who are in hospital, as requested by
